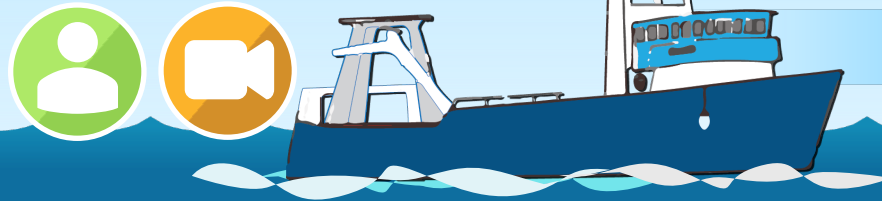


# Fully Counted:

## How Salmon Bycatch is Monitored in the Bering Sea Pollock Fishery

### Catcher vessels

An **observer** or **Electronic Monitoring (EM)** system is deployed on every catcher vessel



**Vessels are required to retain and deliver all salmon**



### Shoreside processors

Observers monitor every delivery from a catcher vessel in the Bering Sea pollock fishery

- **Every salmon** is counted and recorded by observers
- Observers collect **biological samples**



### Catcher/processor and mothership vessels

Operating vessels always have two observers onboard and every haul is monitored

- **Each salmon** is counted and recorded by observers

Cameras verify compliance to ensure that all salmon are given to the observers



As salmon are counted, **biological samples** are also collected and used to determine the fish's age and stock of origin



### What happens to the salmon after they are counted?

Salmon can go to the Prohibited Species Donation Program, which distributes salmon for hunger-relief through non-profit organization [SeaShare](#)



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
