Adjustments to the 2023 Albacore, Swordfish, and Bluefin Reserve Category Quotas

Temporary, final rule to adjust 2023 baseline quotas based on 2022 underharvest & ICCAT limitations

- Species: North Atlantic albacore, North and South Atlantic swordfish, Atlantic bluefin tuna
- Timing: Not effective yet, anticipated to publish Fall 2023

The proposed 2023 adjusted quotas would be:

- Atlantic bluefin tuna Reserve category: 133.9 mt
- North Atlantic albacore tuna: 889.4 mt dressed weight
- North Atlantic swordfish: 3,378.2 mt
- South Atlantic swordfish: 75.2 mt

This action would be effective through December 31, 2023





Harpoon Category Retention Limits, Quota Transfers and Closures via Inseason Action

June 1 - July 13	10 BFT/vessel/day with max of 2 large medium
July 14 - 30	5 BFT/vessel/day with max of 2 large medium
July 21	Add 10.8 mt to Quota
July 30 - December 31	CLOSED

Amendment 13 established the daily retention limit range of 5 to a maximum of 10 BFT/vessel/day (2-4 large medium sized; the rest giants)

Harpoon Category Feedback

- NMFS continues to receive feedback regarding Harpoon fishing behind New England groundfish vessels
- Fishing at night, bait use, not weather dependent, discards, etc.











Harpoon Category Feedback (cont.)

Request to ban harpoon fishing around trawl vessels (groundfish, scallop, or clam dredge vessels)

2022 Petition for Rulemaking denied, yet concerns and requests for action continue

Requesters are concerned that:

- Activity goes against the intent of the Harpoon category fishery and traditional practices
- Could cause the Harpoon category quota to be harvested quickly
- Could bring more and larger vessels into the fishery
- Activity purportedly creates a dangerous situation in which vessels could collide or become tangled in one another's lines
- Increasing number of vessels participating in behavior could exacerbate the above concerns




General Category Average Price/lb,





Exported vs. Domestic Landings


Percent of BFT Landings that are Exported

Unsold General Category Bluefin Tuna






BFT Reporting Requirement for General, Harpoon, and Charter/Headboat Categories

- Vessels are required to report the catch of all BFT retained or discarded dead, within <u>24 hours</u> of landing or end of each trip, by accessing <u>hmspermits.noaa.gov</u> or by using the HMS Catch Reporting app
- Outreach to the fishery continues, including by NOAA Office of Law Enforcement

COMMERCIAL HANDGEAR COMPLIANCE





General Category Restricted Fishing Days (RFDs)

Proposed RFDs in the Atlantic Bluefin Tuna Fishery for 2023 and 2024 (Feedback):

- ➤ 2023 December and 2024 Jan-March time periods; no support
- Support to maintain the Tues, Fri, and Sat RFD schedule
- Received comments to consider 3 and/or 4 consecutive RFDs per week (Thurs, Fri, Sat) or (Fri, Sat, Sun)
- Received comments to eliminate RFDs

2023 RFD Observations to date:

- Concerns/violations associated with fish NOT being offloaded before RFD starts.
 - On an RFD, no vessels may fish for, possess, retain, land, or sell a BFT of any size class, 50 CFR 635.23(a)(2)
 - ➤ A dealer or a dealer's agent must affix a tag to each BFT purchased or received immediately upon offloading or immediately upon the vessel being removed from the water. 50 CFR 635.5(b)(2)(ii)(A)
- Dealer reporting delays around RFDs
 - Property must be no later than 24 hours after receipt of the BFT. 50 CFR 635.5(b)(2)(i)(A)



Federal Atlantic Tunas Dealer Permits

The Greater Atlantic Regional Permitting Office issues federal tuna dealer permits for all states

States issue seafood wholesale permits/licenses and these are the conduit to FDA food safety requirements


Tunas - Scombroid fish poisoning concerns

FDA - Hazard Analysis Critical Control Point (HACCP)

50 CFR 635.4(h)(3)(ii): An applicant must also submit a copy of each state wholesaler's license held by the dealer...

2022 BFT Dead Discards


Currently, the best available annual estimate of U.S. dead discards for 2023 is the 2022 preliminary estimate of 50.4 mt for the pelagic longline fishery.

The United States accounts for dead discards annually and reports them to the International Commission for the Conservation of Atlantic Tunas (ICCAT).

NOAA Fisheries continues to refine reporting methodologies for both pelagic longline and commercial/recreational handgear dead discards




Annual Pelagic Longline Dead Discards by Area



* 2022 dead discard value preliminary




Number of Pelagic Longline Vessels with Bluefin Tuna Landings by Year





Atlantic Pelagic Longline Fishery



2023: 45 leases (total lbs: 85,270, total price: \$126,481); Total of six vessels in quota debt at quarters 1 through 3 end (all resolved)



IBQ Dynamic Allocation Process 2023 Lookback

Basis: Amendment 13

Relevant 36 months of best available data (VMS, Logbook or various combinations)

Data Sources:

- VMS Set Reports 12 hours from the completion of the retrieval of each set.
- Logbooks 7 days from offloading; data finalized by SEFSC ~ May following year

Initial allocation letter (Dec 15, 2022):

234 letters sent; 87 qualified for IBQ allocations

Corrected allocation letter (Dec 20, 2022):

• IBQs recalculated to be inclusive of 25-mt set aside

Appeals process:

- National Appeal Office provides an objective review in accordance with their established protocols.
- 45 days after the initial administrative determination is issued (2/2/23)
- 25 appeals submitted

Most adjudicated between July/August 2023



IBQ Dynamic Allocation Process looking toward 2024

Goals:

- Mitigate the need for vessel owners to appeal initial allocations
- Adapt processes to the findings of NAO adjudicated appeals
- More transparency to the process to empower vessel owners to ensure mandatory data is up to date

Amendment 13:

- Relevant 36 months of best available data (VMS, Logbook or various combinations)
- November 1, 2020 through October 31, 2023

Data Sources:

- VMS Set Reports 12 hours from the completion of the retrieval of each set.
 - Technical issues discovered with a specific VMS unit
 - Addressing non-compliance
- Logbook 7 days from offloading; finalized by SEFSC ~ May following year
 - Addressing lag time in finalized date

Initial allocation letter (Mid-December):

Appeals process:

45 days after the initial administrative determination is issued
